The minute he started playing, I knew he was going to be outstanding.

As the first set went along, the dynamics were changing drastically, however the tempo stayed consistent throughout the performance. His guitar playing was very majestic and legato, with a few twists and turns. When he would begin to tell stories about that certain song, it would be very moving to hear his personal experiences that he told through his fingertips. One song that really caught my attention was his story about his 8<sup>th</sup> grade history class. He was talking about how upset he was that his history teacher didn't tell his class the whole story of Lewis and Clark, and how Meriweather Lewis killed himself a few years after their famous expedition. So he wrote a song called, "Meriweather". I found it to be a moving yet haunting experience to hear that song. During the variety of pieces, I would look around and see the various expressions of the audience. Many of the people were tapping their feet and bopping their heads, so I could obviously tell that they were enjoying his performance very much. I too was enjoying his stellar

performance on both the six-string guitar and twelve-string guitar. The thing that I was most impressed about was by how fast he was able to finger the chords and use improve within the different songs. Throughout my years, I've seen many popular artists play the guitar, but none were as astonishing as Chris Proctor.

The one thing that impressed me the most about his performance was his ability to create spooky yet inspirational music by writing about his life. This really left me wondering about his personality and what his life was like. I think that Chris Proctor did a phenomenal job and was a very well-rounded artist.
