

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Chris Proctor's New Release-

Chris Proctor's new CD, Close and Personal Friends, takes us back to his roots, and unfolds a tapestry of medleys woven from the musical threads of his early years. Each is an organic whole, the pieces knit together with introductions and bridges that Chris composed to order.

For What It's Worth, Stephen Stills' anthem to the 60's protest movement, glides seamlessly into Spooky, the 60's pop/soul nugget from the Classics IV, which then evolves effortlessly into Marvin Gaye's Heard it through the Grapevine. One surprising and delightful medley marries the Beatles, Lynyrd Skynyrd, and Paul Simon, and another pays homage to an obscure Brit guitar hero from the '70's. There's classic rock and pop, soul, folk, British Isles and music from Chris's parents' era. You'll hear echoes of Caribbean pop hits, Scottish jigs, a classic from Oklahoma, another from the Pat Boone/Debby Reynolds movie, Tammy and the Bachelor, and two intriguing compositions from much-admired but obscure Brit guitar hero Dave Evans.

Always on display is Chris's taste in selecting memorable melodies, the compositional and arranging skills with which he builds and joins them, and the crystalline guitar technique with which he bring each one to life.

Some highlights of Close and Personal Friends-

-The opening harmonics and bass line of the Stephen Stills classic, For What It's Worth, which conjure up the stirring original;

- -The eBow intro to the Scottish jig medley, evoking bagpipes swirling about the misty highlands;
- -The melodic twists and turns, and tasty new bridges in his 5-song Beatles/Donovan confection;
- -The rock medley that concludes with a stunning solo guitar version of You Can Call Me Al, Paul Simon's rave-up hit from *Graceland*, including the original's 3-part harmony horns and echoes;
- -The lilting partnership of Corrina, Corrina and People Get Ready with its beautiful 12-string harmonic fade out.

Warm musicality, great taste, stellar technique, quirky humor, complex arranging and consummate composing chops all shine through this recording. Like the subject matter and title, the guitar sound is also close and personal-just a single guitar, top-drawer microphones and preamps, and an intimate, pristine digital environment.

Of course, the CD has treats for guitar aficionados- Chris's colorful palette of 6- and 12-string Taylor guitars, unorthodox techniques, alternate tunings, partial capos, unique eBow use, and slinky slide work will all beguile the guitar players out there.

Close and Personal Friends is Chris's tenth solo project since his touring career began with his National Fingerstyle Championship win 3 decades ago. It completes a circle of sorts, taking his longtime focus on composing new music for guitar, and using it to build a sound sculpture of homage to the sources of that originality. It's a lighter, more accessible work as a result, and a listening treat for both existing fans and those who have never heard his music before.

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Chris Proctor-Solo Guitar Americana

ONE reviewer recently tried to capture the essence of Chris Proctor's music: "What to call his unique melange of styles? There's an aspect of Americana in the echoes of Appalachian and old-timey styles that are apparent in just about every track, but there are also elements of jazz, Celtic folk, and a dash of blues in here somewhere. What Proctor does is create guitar music that reflects the whole heritage of the instrument and still has his own distinct stamp — a tall order, but he's up to the job."

Another reviewer ventures this analysis: "Chris gives the guitar sole responsibility for a piece's rhythmic, melodic, and harmonic components, and in the process creates full-voiced 'guitar songs.' His playing illuminates the instrument's deepest voices and most sonorous qualities, rendering a pop-folk equivalent of the classical guitar sonata."

Throw in the names of Leo Kottke and Michael Hedges, and you come close to the first-time listener's description of Chris Proctor's innovative world of the instrumental, steel-string fingerstyle guitar.


Original music, if it really lives up to its name, is always hard to classify, stewed from a unique set of ingredients, stirred by the writer's creative imagination, and defying easy categorization, but here's what listeners say about Chris Proctor—

- He is an acclaimed composer of original music and a wonderful arranger, whose chosen voice is the steelstring guitar.
- He is an innovative performer and recording artist of the highest order, with a gift for communicating tremendous musical variety, vitality, and accessibility.

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- He coaxes sounds from his instrument which belie the guitar's "folk" or "everyman" reputation, raising it to a near-orchestral range.
- His compositions and arrangements span an amazing spectrum of folk, jazz, pop, classical, and ethnic sensibilities.
- He has ten CDs on Kicking Mule, Flying Fish, Rounder, Windham Hill, and Sugarhouse Records.
- Taylor Guitars of El Cajon, CA introduced the "Chris Proctor Signature Model guitar, a custom instrument designed to his specifications, and promoted Chris's fingerstyle guitar workshops at music stores across the country for twenty years.
- Warner published out a book/master class CD of his best music, Chris Proctor- Guitar Collection.
- Mel Bay published three collections of Chris's compositions, Fingerstyle Magic, a selection of favorite earlier works, the complete folio for Travelogue, and the popular Only Now book/CD set.
- Windham Hill included Chris on two prestigious releases, The Windham Hill Guitar Sampler, which contains his classic, "The Emperor's Choice," and Sounds of Wood and Steel 3, with his "Ozymandias."
- Acoustic Guitar released 2 "Best of Year" book/CD sets, Guitar Masterpieces, with Chris's stellar arrangements of "California Dreamin" and "Paint It Black," and Southbound, which included his amazing "Tap Room."
- Homespun released two instructional DVD's,
 Contemporary Fingerstyle Workshop with Chris
 Proctor and Techniques for Contemporary 12-String Guitar, to strong critical and popular response.

As the enclosures demonstrate, Chris's live and recorded work has attracted high praise from those critics and reviewers who also find it so challenging to label. More to the point, he's a favorite of guitar and music lovers, who know that all you really have to do is listen and enjoy.
